The Mamaroneck School District's annual Veterans Day ceremony took place in Richard M. Kemper Memorial Park on Tuesday, November 10, 2009 at 3:15 p.m. The after-school ceremony was scheduled at this time since school would be closed the following day. The ceremony began with World War II veteran and Gold Star Brother Tony Marsella leading the audience in singing "America the Beautiful."

In his opening remarks, Superintendent Paul Fried noted that it was gratifying to see the large turnout of students present. He then acknowledged all of the veterans who were present by asking them to stand and be recognized. School Board President Linnet Tse spoke of her deep appreciation for the sacrifices made by American soldiers and her father's service as a World War II veteran. Dr. Fried and Mrs. Tse both emphasized the importance of Kemper Memorial Park to our school and our community as a symbol of the sacrifices that have been made to ensure our safety and our freedom. MHS social studies teacher Kathy Donnison read an original poem she had written to honor America's veterans. She was followed by two of her colleagues, Shannon Turner Porter and Janice Landrum who read two poems written by Joyce Kilmer, a sergeant in the 165th U.S. Infantry Regiment who was killed at the Second Battle of Marne in 1918 at the age of 31. As Town Supervisor Valerie O'Keeffe pointed out, Kilmer had also been a Larchmont resident and a street in Larchmont was later named after him. The ceremony concluded with "Taps" played by MHS tenth-grader Danny Fiddelman.

Before and after the ceremony, students could be seen congregating in various parts of the Park. Hommocks students from Richard Darcy's social studies class were doing rubbings of names on the Memorial for their research projects and other MHS and Hommocks students were engaged in conversations with veterans and other attendees. During the actual ceremonies the students were respectful and attentive. Regardless of the fact that they would be off from school the next day, it was obvious that Veterans Day truly meant something to them.

Mission Accomplished

Girl Scouts pledge to do their best to do their duty to their country, often through community- service projects. Several such projects were planned for Saturday, April 24, and one of them was participation in the Kemper Memorial Park Beautification Project.

At 8:30 on Saturday morning, Jan Northrup, President of the Kemper Memorial Park Preservation Fund, along with KMPPF committee members Susan Amlicke and John Esposito attended a breakfast meeting at the Girl Scout House in Larchmont, where Girl Scouts from several local troops had assembled to receive instructions for the day. Accompanying Jan, Susan and John was John's ninety-five-year-old father, John A. Esposito. Mr. Esposito is a World War II veteran who was awarded the Bronze Star and Purple Heart Medals while serving as a Technical Sergeant with the 4th Infantry Division during the Battle of the Bulge in 1945. He was anxious to help with the Kemper Park Project, but said that he also wanted to let the Girl Scouts know how much he appreciated the letters and cookies they deliver to the homes of veterans each year.

Following breakfast, Volunteer Community Chairs Pat Allen and Cathy Bennett called the meeting to order and introduced Jan Northrup and John Esposito, who explained the history of Kemper Memorial Park and the goals of the beautification project. A short time later, the cadre of Scouts, armed with an array of garden tools and sporting brightly-colored gardening gloves donated by Foley's Hardware store, departed for Mamaroneck High School.

Once assembled in Kemper Park, their mission for the day was explained. Assignments included: clearing debris from the Park, planting Girl Scout donated colorful pansies in the stone planters after removing weeds and dead foliage, tilling the soil around the perimeter of the monument in preparation for the red, white and blue petunias that will be planted prior to Memorial Day, and watering the day's plantings. Within minutes, Joann DiBuono, Sabine Ginsberg, Christine Perciasepe, Gabriella Carcano, Rachel Primavera, Victoria Micalizzi, Mia Sheindlin and Alexandra Micalizzi were engaged in their specific tasks. Rakes, shovels and brooms were also wielded by Adult Girl Scout Volunteers Sue Perciasepe, Rosa Micalizzi and Susanne Vasquez.

During a short break, MHS Freshmen Christine Perciasepe and Sabine Ginsberg joined Mr. Esposito to peruse some of the names on the Monument. Christine attempted to estimate Mr. Esposito's age by assuming that he was approximately 18 in 1942. She concluded that he was about 85. When he told her that he had been drafted a few months before Pear Harbor in 1941 and was actually 26 years old when he entered the army, she and Sabine began to recalculate. After a while they both seemed uncertain about their calculation. Mr. Esposito was thoroughly amused when Christine finally stated: "You can't possibly be that old!"

A timely delivery of top soil and the water truck by MHS groundskeepers brought the day to a successful conclusion. Thanks to our Girl Scouts, it was: **Mission Accomplished!**











Flagpole Installation Marks Beginning of Kemper Memorial Park Restoration

This year's Memorial Day ceremonies in Kemper Memorial Park will be enhanced by the new flagpole that was installed earlier this month. Thanks to generous donations from the VFW, American Legion Post 90, American Legion Post 347, The Knights of Columbus, Anthony & Josephine Marsella and Joel & Carmela Robins, the thirty-foot flagpole, adjacent to the Monument, became the first of many planned additions and improvements to the Park. A formal dedication of the flagpole will take place in June. Further information will follow soon.

New Kemper Memorial Display Debuts at MHS

Through our continued collaboration with Dr. Fried and the Board of Education, we have been permitted to use two of the display cases in the lobby of the main entrance to Mamaroneck High School. They will showcase artifacts, photographs and biographical information to give students and visitors a better understanding of the impact of World War II on the Larchmont/Mamaroneck community, especially the families and friends of those whose names are inscribed on the Kemper Memorial.

The current display includes a large map delineating where each of the 99 honorees once lived. Another portion of the display is dedicated to individual honorees that will be spotlighted throughout the year. The first of them is John J. Marsella, who was killed in action at Anzio Beach in 1944. Specific information about John's life growing up in Mamaroneck, his military experiences and a replica of the Purple Heart Medal, like the one that he and the other 98 honorees were awarded, are also included in this section.

We hope you will take the opportunity to view this exhibit during the upcoming Memorial Day ceremonies or whenever you visit MHS.

The Kemper Foundation will award two \$250 prizes for the best essays. An additional prize of \$100 will be awarded for the best poster to publicize the contest.

Winning essays will be read and prizes will be awarded at a special Memorial Day ceremony at Mamaroneck High School scheduled for **May 25** at **3 p.m.**
