

We are pleased to report that plans are now being finalized to begin the first phase of the Kemper Memorial Park restoration and beautification project. Using the Park's original plans and current measurements they have taken, several MHS students are creating a new blueprint to illustrate what we envision Kemper Park will look like with new pathways, lush green lawns, an illuminated flagpole and an array of perennial plantings designed by landscape architect and retired Chatsworth Avenue School teacher David Miles.

Wilson Kizer, Kira Hoffman, Jon Holton, John Russo, Evan Amber and Alex Neir are members of the MHS Architecture Club, sponsored by MHS technology teacher Craig Romanek and the plot plan they have been working on will be useful in our fund-raising drive, through which we hope to raise much of the money that will be needed to fund the project. Understandably, in light of the current economy, it is unlikely that the School District will be able to supplement the funds we raise. However, Dr. Fried and the Board of Education have been and will continue to be valuable partners in this endeavor.

The first item on our agenda is the installation of an irrigation system for the lawns and flowers. With proper irrigation, the new lawns will remain healthy, as will the flower beds that will produce various combinations of red, white and blue flowers from early spring to late autumn. Next will come new pathways to provide safer and more attractive access to the Park and the Monument. Later phases will incorporate an illuminated flagpole, granite benches (as once existed) and trash receptacles.

Of course, all of this will take both money and commitment. Currently, we have only a portion of the money that we will need, but the commitment we have seen assures us that we will achieve our goal. We are confident in your continued support and the School Board has pledged to assist us in any way they can. The ever-increasing positive energy surrounding this project guarantees that the new Kemper Memorial Park will soon be a reality.

Recently, KMPPF President Jan Northrup received a very special gift from Tex Austin (pictured at left). On April 22, 1945, Tex was serving aboard the USS Isherwood off the coast of Okinawa when the ship was attacked by Japanese Kamikaze planes. Among Tex's shipmates who were killed in the ensuing battle was Tillio Santangelo from Mamaroneck. Both Tex and the USS Isherwood survived that battle and the remainder of World War II. When Tex left the Navy, one of the souvenirs he took with him was the division flag that flew above the bridge of the Isherwood on that fateful day (pictured right). Upon hearing of our efforts to connect with anyone with information about the Kemper 99, Tex sent the flag to Jan to honor the memory of his shipmate, Tillio Santangelo. Tex's gesture emphasizes the importance of remembering. Tex has been assured that the flag will become part of a permanent display that will serve as a constant reminder of the debt we owe to those who sacrificed so much to preserve our freedom.
