Seventy years ago, Principal Hoyt D. Smith's letter (at left) described a beautiful park that would be hallowed ground for all time. He also called Kemper Memorial Park a sanctuary that would inspire pupils. These comments echoed the Kemper family's desire that the Park would always be a valuable asset to our schools and our community.

During the decades that followed, Kemper Memorial Park suffered the wear and tear of aging as well as the prospect of an uncertain future. Nevertheless, it has endured and its most recent renaissance assures us that it will forever remain a fitting memorial to its honorees, a resource through which our students will learn valuable lessons and a tranquil setting for reflection and enjoyment.

The Kemper Memorial Park Preservation Fund takes great pride in having spearheaded the drive to restore and beautify Kemper Memorial Park. 2017 Kemper Contest Winners

Once again, MHS students who participated in our annual contest produced impressive work in a variety of genres. The question posed to them this year was: **How does service to country allow the ordinary man or woman to become heroic?** The four winning entries included two poems and two videos. In each case, thoughtful reflection on the topic was evident. And, as always, the creative lens through which the topic was viewed made each of these entries outstanding.



Kaitlin Spiridellis used poetry to conclude that serving one's country doesn't necessarily make a hero. It just reveals a hero who was there all the time.



Annbabel Summo and Sarah Larsen composed a poem titled INVISIBLE in which they ask us to consider that outward appearance can be deceiving and actually hide the hero inside someone. They illustrate this by describing the transformation of someone who was "Once the lonely kid with a dim future" to someone who "impacts more lives than anyone will ever know."



Hanna Young produced and directed a film titled TWO HEROES. She cast her parents in the starring roles to emphasize the heroism of both the veteran and the family that he or she leaves behind. In her introduction, Hanna states that she was happy to create this video as a tribute to all families who display such extreme courage on a daily basis.



Jadalyn Ortiz produced a video in which she interviewed Corporal Harry K. Anthopoulos, a U.S. Army veteran of the Vietnam War, who explains that heroism just happens spontaneously when you are put into a situation you could never imagine finding yourself in. Because of this, he feels that anyone has the potential to be a hero. Jadalyn also acknowledges Sgt. Anthony Ortiz for providing his photos from his time as a combat photographer in the United States Mare Corps.
