

Lt. Berry Loses Life In France

Army Officer, Reported
First As Missing, Now
Listed As Dead

WIFE RECEIVES WORD

Lt. Charles L. Berry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles C. Berry of 21 North Chateworth Avenue, Larchmont, was killed in action on June 12, according to a telegram received Saturday by his wife, the former Jean Kolbe, of 31 Liberty Avenue, New Rochelle. Lt. Berry had previously been reported as missing in the invasion of France.

Overseas with an Infantry Division in England since January, Lt. Berry enlisted in July, 1942, receiving his commission at Fort Benning, Ga., on Feb. 5, 1943, upon graduating from Officers' Candidate School.

Following basic training at Camp Croft, S. C., he was stationed at Camp Claiborne, La., Hill Military Reservation, Fredericksburg, Va., and Camp McCoy, Wis.

A former resident of Clifton Park, Lakewood, Ohio, Lt. Berry was graduated from Lakewood High School, and in 1936 from Dartmouth College, where he was a member of Phi Gamma Delta fraternity.

Prior to enlisting, he was associated with Montgomery-Ward in New York City. His wife and young daughter, Lynne reside with Mrs. Berry's parents, Mr. and Mrs. William F. Kolbe of the New Rochelle address. His last letter home was written the day before the invasion, June 5.

Memorial services will be held Saturday at 11 A. M. at St. John's Episcopal Church in Larchmont.
