

Lt. Berry Reported As Missing

**Infantry Officer Lost
In French Invasion
Since June 12**


IN SERVICE 2 YEARS

Second Lieut. Charles L. Berry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles C. Berry of 21 North Chatsworth Avenue, Larchmont, has been missing in action in the invasion of France since June 12, according to a telegram from the War Department.

Lt. Berry is married to the former Jeanne Kolbe, who resides with her daughter, Lynne, at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William F. Kolbe, of 31 Liberty Avenue, New Rochelle.

Stationed in England with an Infantry Division since January, Lt. Berry enlisted in July, 1942, and was commissioned at Fort Benning, Ga., where he attended Officers' Candidate School, on Feb. 5, 1943. He was previously stationed at Camp Claiborne, La., Hill Military Reservation, Fredericksburg, Va., and Camp McCoy, Wis. He received basic training at Camp Croft, S. C.

A former resident of Clifton Park, Lakewood, Ohio, Lt. Berry was graduated from Lakewood High School and from Dartmouth College, Class of 1935. He was a member of Phi Gamma Delta Fraternity. Prior to entering the service, he was associated with Montgomery-Ward in New York City. His last letter home was dated June 5, the day before D-day.

Sgt. Sullivan Dies In Action On Saipan

Sgt. James P. Sullivan, of the "Fighting Irish" 165th Infantry, brother of Mrs. William B. Sullivan of 1501 Pine Knoll Drive, Mamaroneck, was killed in action on Saipan on June 23, according to a telegram received last night by his sister.

A member of the National Guard, Sgt. Sullivan had been overseas three years, after enlisting four years ago. Stationed on the West Coast before Pearl Harbor, he later served in Hawaii and was a veteran of the Gilbert Islands. He was formerly employed as a stock clerk in New York.

Surviving, besides his sister, the former Jean Sullivan, is a brother, William B. Sullivan, of Port Chester.
