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# 2 OF WAR DEAD EN ROUTE BACK TO LARCHMON

Bodies of Anne Cullen and
Lieut. Berry Arrive
Late This Week

The bodies of Anne Kathleen Cullen and Second Lieut. Charles L. Berry of Larchmont are due to arrive this week in New York aboard the U. S. Army Transports Robert F. Burns and John L. Mc-Carley, respectively, which are carrying the remains of more than 5,000 men and women who gave their lives in the fighting in Europe.

The Robert F. Burns is expected to dock this afternoon at Pier 3, Brooklyn Army Base. Services will be held at 11 A. M. Friday before the bodies are removed. The John L. McCarley is scheduled to arrive Sunday.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Cullen of 11 Woodbine Avenue, Miss Cullen was the first woman war casualty reported in this area. She was killed while serving at an Army hospital in Belgium when it was struck by a Nazi flying bomb Dec. 20, 1944.

Lieut. Berry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles C. Berry of 21 North Chatsworth Avenue, was killed in action June 12, 1944, in France, six days after the D-Day invasion. He was serving with the 29th Infantry Division

## DE VEAU NAMED **POLICE SERGEANT**

Disabled Vet Appointed Salary of \$3,840: Served 12 Years

The Board of Police Commissioners last week appointed Patrolman Eugene DeVeau as sergeant in the Town Police Department, effective April 1, at an annual salary of \$3.840.

Sgt. DeVeau, a disabled veteran of World War II, was first appointed to the department in 1936. He left Nov. 23, 1942, to enter the Army. As a corporal, he served with the 12th and 15th Army Air Forces in the Mediterranean Theater of Operations, After three years of service, he returned to the Town Police Department in November, 1945.

Born in New Rochelle, the son of the late Samuel DeVeau and Mrs. Mary DeVeau of the Chatsworth Gardens Apartments, he has resided in Larchmont for the last 32 years. Sgt. DeVeau attended St. Augustine's Parochial School and was graduated from Iona School in 1926.

Sgt. DeVeau went to work with his late father, who was in the building and construction business, in 1926. Mr. DeVeau died in 1934.

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Born in Baltimore in June. 1918, Miss Cullen came to Larchmont as an infant. She was graduated from Ursuline School in New Rochelle and attended Georgian Court College in New Jersey and the Art Students' League and the Traphagen School in New York City. She was a member of St. Augustine's Church, where she sang with the choir, and was a yachting enthusiast, sailing in Star and International Class races on the Sound.

She began fraining for foreign Red Cross service in June, 1943, after serving with the Westchester A.R.C. Motor Corps and the British - American Ambulance Corps in New York City. Following a training period Washington, D. C., she left for duty in England, and had been serving in Normandy and other sections of France before her last assignment.

Surviving, in addition to her parents, are a sister, Nancy, and two brothers. Vincent. Jr., teaching in college as a missionary in the Philippines, and Robert, a Navy veteran, who is also studying for the priesthood in Pennsylvania.
