THE RICHARD M. KEMPER PARK'S PROFILES IN COURAGE

1000 West Boston Post Road, Mamaroneck

Over sixty years ago, Adolph and Helen Kemper bought three parcels of land on the Boston Post Road. They donated this land to the Mamaroneck School District with the proviso that "all of said parcels...be collectively known as "Richard Kemper Park" in perpetuity. With their own monies, they subsequently designed and landscaped a quiet, contemplative enclave complete with granite benches and a monument. The Richard M. Kemper Park was dedicated on May 25, 1947. It honors not only the Kempers' only son, Richard, but also the other 98 individuals from the Mamaroneck School District who died while serving their country in World War II.

On D-Day, June 6, 1944, the Allies invaded Normandy. This was a turning point for the Allies in the European Theater. To help commemorate its anniversary, the following profiles are submitted.
