Eagle Project Completed



When Robert Britto explained his Eagle Scout Project to the audience on May 30, his pride was evident and the praise he received throughout the day was well deserved. Almost one year earlier Robert conceived his project and during the months that followed he diligently executed his plan. The mahogany flag holders he constructed were used for the first time that day and participants also got their first look at the spectacular perennial garden that he and his fellow Scouts finished installing the week before. As promised, Robert completed his ambitious project in time for this year's Memorial Day Ceremony.

Creativity Abounds in Kemper Memorial Contest Entries


We hoped that including more departments and offering students several options in this year's contest would increase participation and stimulate creativity. The results were so impressive that Social Studies teacher Peter Greene and his team of judges had a difficult time selecting four winners from more than fifty entries.

Students were asked to respond to the question:

Why are war memorials important today?

The question was prompted by former Secretary of State Colin Powell's statement: "Take the time to remember the good souls whose memories are a blessing to you and your family. Take your children to our memorial parks and monuments."

Students were encouraged to respond in a variety of formats: essays, poems, short films, visual art projects and dance or musical compositions. On Thursday, May 26, four MHS students presented their works and received their \$250 prizes



Two of the winners, Tricia Ballard and Helene Graham, displayed their artwork. In both cases the artists focused on the transition of students to soldiers and they seemed to be intrigued by the notion that people not much older than themselves were suddenly called upon to make great sacrifices.

Helene illustrated this point by dividing her drawing between a group of carefree students lounging against the Kemper Memorial and a group of soldiers firing their weapons behind a sandbag wall. Although her piece contrasted past and present generations, it also conveyed the haunting message that what happened before could happen again in the future.

Tricia's drawing portrayed silhouettes marching before an unfurled American Flag. A closer look at the figures reveals that they alternate between students carrying backpacks and helmeted soldiers carrying equipment. Tricia explained that she views Mamaroneck High School itself as a memorial to the veterans who once walked its halls as students



Alia Shenasa's feelings about memorials were expressed in her poem titled: **Tempo**. The poem is a series of references to letters to and from the speaker's lost lover. The letters themselves, bound together with a rubber band, have become her private memorial, offering her some consolation for the loss she must endure.



Emily Morris's entry was inspired by a visit to The Tomb of the Unknowns in Arlington Cemetery. She wrote and performed an original song, titled:

I Surrender. Although the song's title may at first appear puzzling, Emily's message soon becomes clear. She speaks from the perspective of the unknown soldier who has surrendered everything for his country – his life as well as his identity. It is a moving piece, and was made even more so by the emotion in Emily's voice as she sang it.

Obviously, creativity abounds within our student population and we look forward to seeing more evidence of it in next year's contest entries.

Honorable mentions included an essay by **Angel Athill**, a three-part oil painting depicting the different stages in the life of a soldier by **Emily Shen**, and portraits of the 101 names on the Kemper Monument by **Kevin Sejdiu**.
